OUR MISSION

- To promote the alleviation of animal suffering through education initiatives, encouraging responsible domestic animal ownership
- To provide basic veterinary care to the low income and vulnerable population
- To protect wildlife through domestic animal care in Ngamiland; providing sterilisation and vaccination of dogs and cats to reduce the disease risk posed to wildlife and the human population

HOW DO WE DO IT

Clinic based in Maun

Where we run a CNVR (collect, neuter, vaccinate and return)clinic and we provide veterinary care for the animals of low income families

Mobile Clinic Outreaches

Our outreach work brings vital veterinary care to isolated communities delivering the chance of a better future to thousands of animals Outside big towns there is little or no veterinary assistance. Government vets occasionally conduct rabies vaccination campaigns but do not vaccinate against other diseases or offer neutering services.

Domestic animal education

We verbally educate the owners of domestic animals and also distribute dual-language educational leaflets which focus on the basics of animal welfare and disease prevention.

Kids also learn (and have fun!) about animal welfare with coloring books

Adopting and Rehoming

In cases of emergency, MAWS will accept and assist in re-homing abandoned animals or those in distress. As MAWS is not set up as a sanctuary we encourage pet owners and caring members of the public to find new homes for these animals directly and we will gladly guide them through the process. Our adoption policy applies and includes home checks and follow-ups and education on animal care.



WHY ARE OUTREACHES IMPORTANT

BENEFITS FOR PETS AND OWNERS

Sterilizing is key in communities with limited resources (water, food, vet care) preventing unwanted litters and overpopulation.

Direct benefits to pets: longer and healthier lives (reduced risk of uterine infections and breast cancer, testicular cancer, less likely to wander and fight, improved physical condition and behavior).

Vaccinating protects the pets against deadly viruses like rabies, parvovirus, distemper...

BENEFITS FOR WILDLIFE

Vaccinating pets living adjacent to wildlife populations creates buffer zones reducing the risk of transmissible and deadly viruses such as:

<u>Distemper</u>: Previous outbreaks have significantly impacted lion and wild dog populations.

Rabies: transmissible between all mammals, including humans

Cat sterilization: inter-breeding with the African Wild Cat is one of the biggest threats to their survival

EQUINE CLINICS



Recognising the growing need for working equine welfare in Botswana and the lack of support for this, MAWS, in conjunction with the international charity SPANA, embarked on a programme to educate people on the value and care of working equines. In 2024 we conducted a number of successful outreaches and "donkey" days and this programme will continue into 2025 with the funding provided by SPANA. This project could not be carried out without the help of a local organisation, Equine Assist, who's focus is on helping the working horses and donkeys in Ngamiland, and their boots on the ground have ensured that we reach as many equines in need as possible. We will be engaging with the local Kgotla's on our various upcoming outreaches and distributing our educational material developed on Care of Working Equines.

MAUN CLINIC

Besides the daily routine of spaying, neutering and vaccinating, we encounter a wide variety of cases, mostly:

- Sick puppies: they have never been vaccinated or treated for parasites.
- Hit by cars: unfortunately very common, bringing all kind of fractures and injuries
- Emaciated and abandoned dogs
- Tick borne diseases

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- Transmissible venereal tumor: widely spread in Botswana
- Wounds: in all sizes, shapes and colors

Winter had boiling water poured over him by a terrible human being. He spent some weeks with us where he had his skin cleaned and treated daily, in addition to the antibiotics and pain medication.



Our clinic encounters a variety of fractures and injuries that may require animals to spend time in our kennels. Depending on the severity, a fracture can be treated with a splint and necessitate 6 to 8 weeks of recovery in our facilities. In more serious cases, amputation of the limb may be the best course of action if the extremity cannot be saved. In the most severe instances with extensive injuries, the kindest option may be to alleviate suffering.


Is not rare to find neglected animals roaming in and around Maun. Emaciated, scavenging what they can to survive and, more often than not, sick and infested with parasites.

At MAWS they get nursed back to health: they are treated for the diseases that they might have (usually they have Ehrlichia, a tick borne disease, and/or Transmissible venereal tumors), they are vaccinated, treated for parasites, sterilized but most important they are given lots of food and attention, things they hadn't experience in a long time, if ever.

Once they have recovered physically and emotionally

Once they have recovered physically and emotionally they are rehomed.











Bobby, our amazing girl with a lively spirit, joined us in early May after a traumatic incident—**she was stabbed three times by thieves**, with one blow damaging her spine and leaving her paralyzed.

We saw a glimmer of hope in one of her legs and decided to bet on her recovery. Her cheerful attitude and zest for life inspired us to start physiotherapy and help with her basic needs.

Bobby made steady progress and by early June, she reached the incredible milestone of standing on her own. Since then, her improvements have been amazing. She still faces some challenges, but now she walks and even runs like a typical dog, enjoying life to the fullest.





THE OTHER SIDE OF THE COIN...

We enjoy sharing stories with happy endings, but, unfortunately, that's not always the reality. While we wish we could save every animal, sometimes the damage is irreversible, and the animal is in pain. In such situations, the most compassionate action is to end their suffering.

Not all emaciated dogs can recover, sometimes their prolonged situation has developed chronic issues





Rabid animals have to be euthanized. Rabies has no cure (once symptoms are developing), is deadly and highly contagious.


